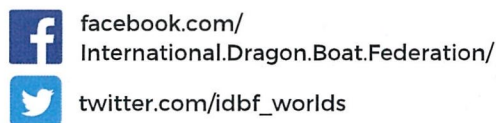

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to this edition of Long Zhou, the only official newsletter of the IDBF.

As we all look forward to the racing in Thailand next month, it is worth a moment's reflection on the last Championships in Szeged where all previous records for participation were exceeded. In this year's Nations Championship, we will again be setting records with the largest ever number of competitors for a Nations Championship.

Will dragon boating be in the next Olympics?

Many people constantly ask the question about when dragon boating will be in the Olympics. The first stage is for the IDBF to gain recognition from the IOC for which we have been applying since 2008.

In the General Meeting of Alliance of Independent Recognised Members of Sports (AIMS) held on the Gold Coast (Australia) in May, the IOC announced that they would be revising the recognition process and the new process will open in the second quarter of 2021.

All previous applications would not be considered and that Federations seeking recognition would need to start again. This was a major disappointment to us and the other AIMS members seeking recognition.

The conclusion to this is that it will be a long time before the sport we love gets into the Olympic Games.

In the mean time we will be working to ensure that we are well prepared to meet the application requirements and will be working to be transparent and equitable in everything we do.

IDBF Congress 2019

The IDBF Congress will be held on Monday 26th August in the official hotel, Ambassador Jomtien Pattaya. There will be many important decisions to make including:

- elections of key positions
- changes to Statutes and Bye-Laws
- new Competition Regulations and Rules of Racing to be introduced in January 2020, and
- decisions on the bids for location of future Championships from 2022 onwards.

If you have any recommendations for changes to regulations or racing rules, please submit them quickly for consideration.

It is an important Congress so please ensure that you are represented.

I would like to take this opportunity of introducing Victoria Jou-Chung Chang (張柔中), who is our new IDBF Administrative Assistant.

Victoria started in May. She is a big asset and will help us as an organisation to be more effective and responsive.

In closing, I hope to see many of you in Thailand for the 14th World Dragon Boat Racing Championships.

OLYMPIC CHANNEL WELCOMES SIX SPORT GOVERNING BODIES

OFFICIAL MEDIA RELEASE FROM THE OLYMPIC CHANNEL

MADRID – 16 July 2019 – The Olympic Channel today announced that it has reached agreements with the international governing bodies for armwrestling, chess, dragon boat, icesports, lifesaving and sepaktakraw to collaborate on content. The six new cooperation agreements bring the number of the global platform's federation partners to 91.

The Rowing & Canoeing Association of Thailand (RCAT), trusted by the International Dragon Boat Federation (IDBF) to host the 14th IDBF World Dragon Boat Racing Championships, will be held next month on 20-25 August 2019 in Pattaya-Rayong, Thailand.

It is the first time that Thailand will have close to 4,000 athletes in this competition from all around the world. RCAT is excited to be hosting a world-class water sports competition that will help promote the development of the sport as well as sports tourism in Thailand.

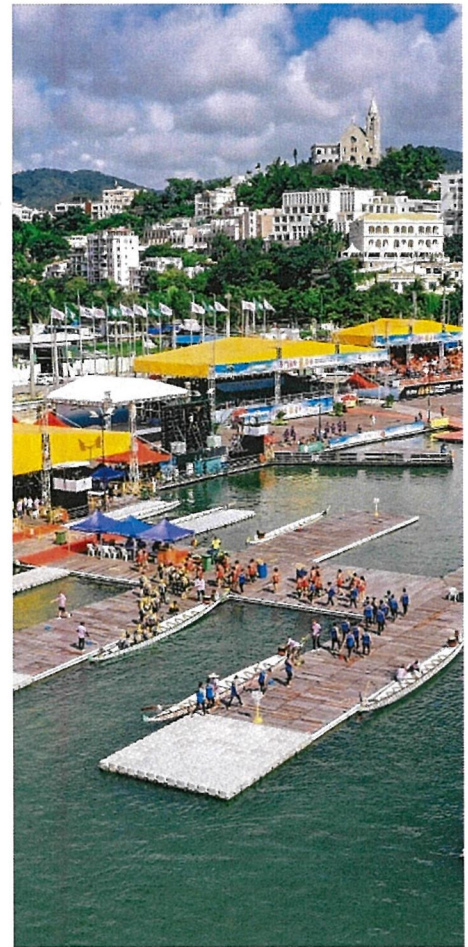

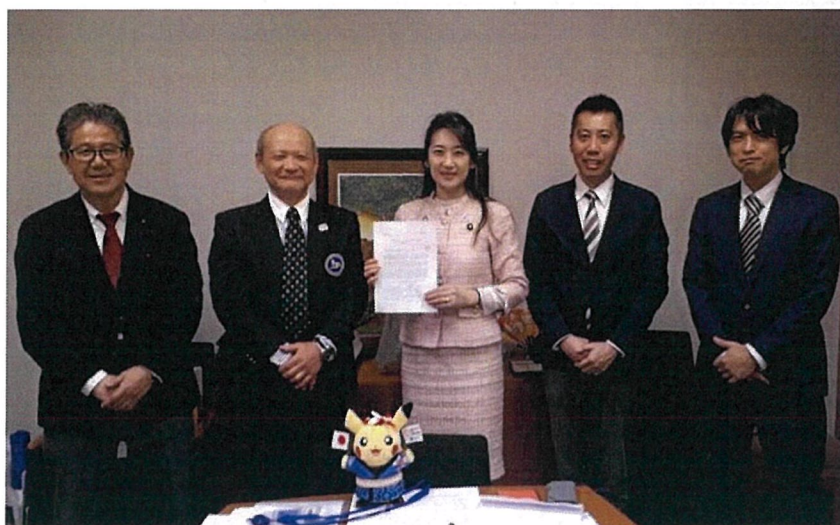

18TH EDBF EUROPEAN CLUB CREW CHAMPIONSHIPS 2019

The 18th EDBF European Club Crew Championships (ECCC) is less than a week away and will be held in the historic city of Seville, in the south-west corner of Spain between 25th – 28th July 2019.

Racing will take place on the River Guadalquivir at the CEAR La Cartuja; a specialised centre which has hosted many World and European rowing and canoeing championships.

The Championships will see in excess of 2,000 athletes from 73 clubs in 18 nations compete for the title of the top club in Europe.

This will be the biggest ECCC ever hosted and the EDBF is delighted that the sport of dragon boating is growing in Europe. We gladly welcome Georgia, a new member to the EDBF who will be attending their first EDBF Championships.



European Cup

This year, the EDBF is trialling a new Euro Cup Series with the following events forming the '2019 Euro Cup':

1. Barcelona – 18-19/05/2019
2. ECCC, Seville – 25-28/07/2019
3. Nottingham – 21-22/09/2019
4. Belgrade – 27-28/09/2019
5. Rome – 19-20/10/2019

The idea is to run a series of dragon boat races in EDBF Member cities which have interesting tourist locations and offer professional levels of event organisation. Generally the Euro Cup races are being run along side existing established events, but the EDBF

will provide supervising race officials, communication support and provide EDBF medals. The overall winners of the Euro Cup will be a nation based on a point scoring system at each event with prizes presented at the annual EDBF Gala Dinner.

The concept behind the Euro Cup is a 'win win' for both the EDBF and the Organising Committee.

- It will give opportunities to the national federations to show case their events.
- Increase revenue.
- Re-launch the standard dragon boat class at club level.
- Provide youth development.
- Support EDBF Championships participation.



UKRAINIAN DRAGON BOAT CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Ukrainian Dragon Boat Championship 2019 was recently held on 6-7 July in Kiev.

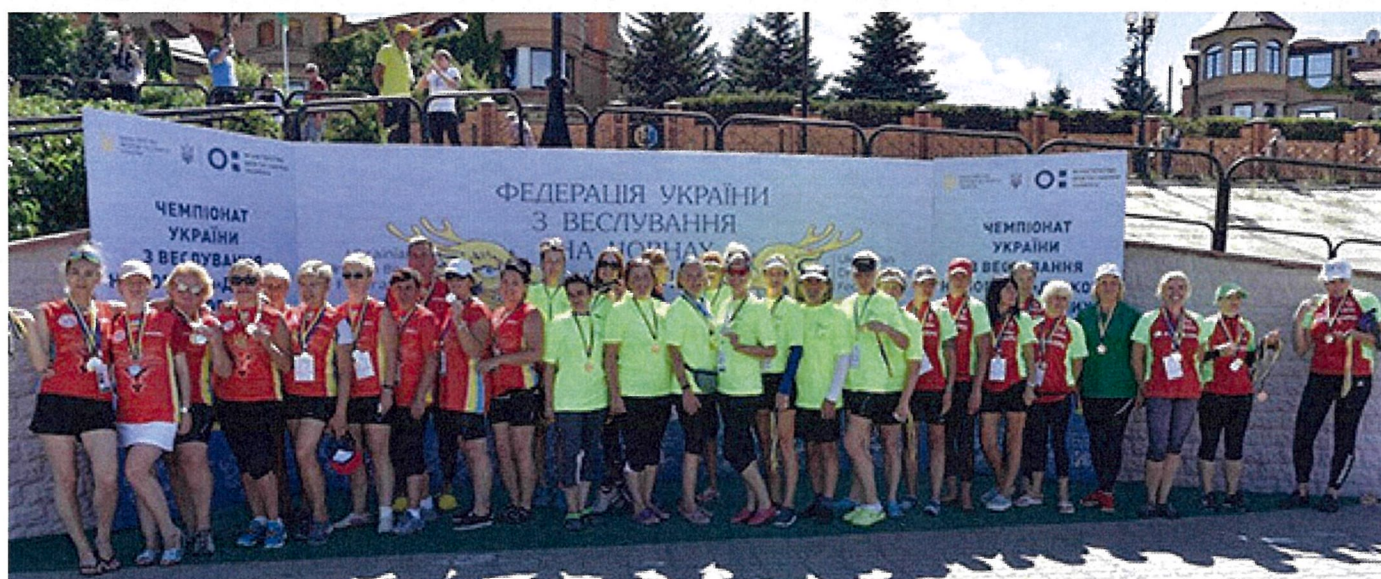
The Championship was preceded by numerous competitions in the regions with more than ten of the strongest crews from each of the areas represented in the National Championship.

Dragon boating in Ireland covers the full 32 counties and has no north/south divide and we are pleased to say we now have dragon boat clubs in all regions.

The Dragon Run 10km

This year the IDBA trialed a new event in March, The Dragon Run 10km in Carlow Town. This marathon pursuit race saw numerous dragon boats, kayaks and Ols battle it out on the River Barrow over the 4 x 2.5km course. There was a mass start for the Ols and kayaks followed by interval starts for each of the dragon boats. The event was designed to test the endurance skills of the paddlers as well as testing the ability of the dragon boat helms around the tight turns. The 2019 winning team were Kendra Warriors from Athy in a time of 53:25 minutes.

Dragon Boat season in Ireland is now in full swing with our annual events of the Athy Dragon Boat Regatta and the Barrow Dragon Boat Regatta proving the Irish teams are getting more competitive all the time. Although we do not always have the warmer temperatures that other countries have we are blessed with some very scenic race venues.



PAN AMERICAN CHAMPIONSHIP

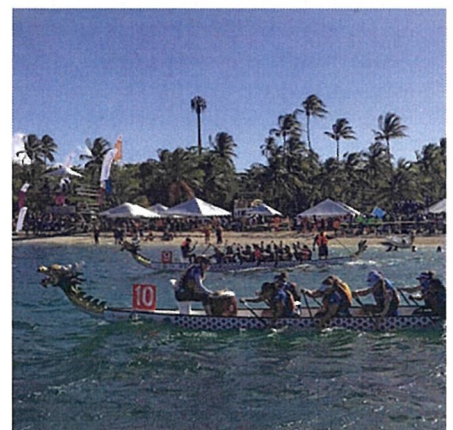

31ST CONCORD PACIFIC DRAGON BOAT FESTIVAL

Concord Pacific Dragon Boat Festival welcomes world to Vancouver for North America's flagship dragon boat festival.

The 31st Concord Pacific Dragon Boat Festival was held from June 21-23, 2019 in Vancouver, Canada. Approximately 5,500 racers from around the world enjoyed three days of competitive races on False Creek in Mixed, Women, Open, and Junior Mixed categories. In addition to the races, over 100,000 spectators enjoyed cultural programming featuring top Canadian artists, traditional Chinese performances and displays, and acrobatic shows that showcase Canada's multicultural diversity and heritage.

As always, the top divisions featured tight racing, with most finals seeing boats come in fractions of seconds apart from each other. The Festival's hotly contested Premier Mixed Grand Final saw False Creek Racing Canoe Club reclaim the top prize at the Festival for the first time since 2015. Mr. CaNoe returned to Vancouver and managed to fend off a strong challenge from local teams to reclaim the Premier Open gold medal by a margin of 1.7 seconds. Gorging Dragons 50+ Women won the gold in the Premier Women division. In the Junior Mixed division, Laoyam Eagles defended their gold medal in a tight race that saw the next four placements determined by under half a second.

This year, the racers ranged in age from 12-89 and included paddlers from all walks of life. The Festival's accessibility mandate ensures that all junior teams pay no entry fees to race at the Festival. Paddlers that face barriers to participation received subsidized entry fees, including teams comprised of refugees, LGBTQ2+ individuals, Indigenous peoples, cancer and medical teams.

In addition, the Festival's six charity partners had the opportunity to compete against each other on the water and online in a fundraising race for a \$5,000 gift from sponsor Concord Pacific to help fund their worthwhile community work.

Visitors enjoyed a live broadcast of the event on-site and carried online worldwide, allowing them to watch races while enjoying shows on the Main Stage as part of an effort to make the Festival accessible and engaging for the public. The Festival also featured a Taoist blessing ceremony and an Indigenous blessing and welcome, recognizing the ancient traditions behind dragon boat and the traditional territories of the Indigenous peoples on which the Festival was held.

Planning is already underway for next year's event, which promises to be bigger and better than in 2019.

The dates of June 19-21, 2020 have been selected for the Festival, and teams from around the world are invited to race in Vancouver next year in the spirit of culture, community, and competition.

AUSDBF AND NZDBA SIGN MOU

Competition was fierce with many clubs focused on qualifying for CCWC 2020 in France.

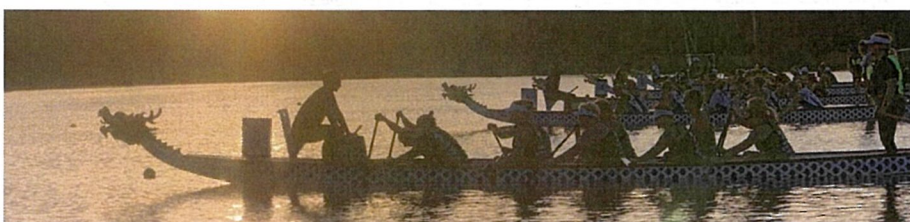
Competitors were blessed with perfect weather over the five days of racing – sun, little wind and no rain.

the professionalism of the Australian Championships in the future.

Whilst this wasn't the largest Australian Championships by competitor numbers it certainly was by actual number of races.
